family offers solidarity and security; it is also oppressive and controlling at times. In their reach for women's rights, Palestinian women are careful not to allienate a conservative mass base rooted in the refugee camps, for it is from this mass base and from the "sons of the camps" that Palestinian national consciousness is defended.

The result of Peteet's work is a stunning ethnography in which an anthropologist—working literally under fire and in the midst of myriad ideologies—is able to use the rigors of her profession to contextualize the idea that Palestinian women are the "sisters of men."

Through this eerie and spellbinding book, the reader enters a world of women who never part with their dead. In laments they define and strengthen their bond with the dead, in dreams and divination they learn hidden truths about deaths and lives of the future and past, and in caretaking of the corpse. the grave, and the exhumed remains of the dead, they maintain the bodily intimacy and the continuity of substance with the dead that church and reason would deny them. While the men in Seremetakis' book turn their faces away from both love and death, the women immerse themselves in, comprehend, and master both. While the men devalue women for their "superstitious" and "emotional" natures, the women subvert the money-and-guns social order of the men by learning and speaking the truth of death, thus earning their right to utter "the last word."

Seremetakis is an ethnographer trained in the United States who returns to her rural East European home to document the visions and thoughts of her kinsfolik. These visions and thoughts are already internal—native—to her, and her interpretation of them grows organically from them, crossing seas again to touch us. Perhaps for this reason, or perhaps because the site of the research is Greece—source of the civilization we call our own—or perhaps because the topic of the book is love reaching literally into the bones of the beloved, this volume resonates to a depth untouched by any other monograph I have seen.

The term archaeology (in the Foucaldian sense) occurs several times in this book and it is apt, for it indexes Maniat culture's core dimension. In Inner Mani, patriclans build stone towers as monuments to their pride and to their military prowess. Inner Maniat men have for centuries kept up on the latest in military technology, Seremetakis tells us. Battle wounds and gunshot deaths among them as well as among their women are commonplace. Clans compete to see who can build the tallest and strongest towers. A tower endows its builders with visual superiority as well as with impenetrability—a high slit from which to fire upon outsiders. From such

fortified positions the men conduct their feuds and other business, including a codly economic marriage-traffic in daughters. Meanwhile,

Maniat women ... emerge from the low entrances and exits of their tower-houses, from underneath a heavy load of wood or water carried on their backs, only to bend again over a rocky terrain during agricultural work, over an open or covered grave in the cometery, over the protected cistern at the bottom of their towers. When the "whisper" of death comes, these bent women, creatures of the back alleys, stand up. They stretch their upper body and throw the head back, pulling out their loosened hair. They raise fists against the sky, beating their chests in arger, scratching their faces, screaming. It is then that one sees Maniat women in their full height, Ipp. 74—751

"To examine death in Inner Mani is to look at Maniat society through female eyes," the author tells us (p. 15). With a great wealth of historical, textual, ethnographic, and linguistic detail, she makes her point—to my mind—irrefutably. Numerous laments. and conversations with lamenters are quoted and translated verbatim and at length. From the space of death that they have made their refuge, Maniat women cry out against both God and man, unambiguously testifying to their experience that the claims of the dominant culture are lies. Against the classical Greek image of the perfect, incorrodable male body, they the cynicism of "the veteran exhumer" who is "condemned always to see the bones. beneath the flesh of the living" (p. 227). Against the rhythmless, passionless monotone of liturgical chanting, they pose the polyphony and the screaming of their laments, turning each funeral ceremony into a contest with the priest and the men of their own houses over the meaning of life and death. finally, against the authority of the male-owned written word, they pose the consciousness of the diviner, who, "as the light shadow person, always visualizes deep structures of temporal connection, of which the bounded time of society is but a sympsown\*\* (px. 227).

The shadows of the Inner Maniat landscape, one magines, contrast sharply with the sunlight, and in the same fashion the line between women and men here seems almost too sharply drawn. Seremetakis notes this and suggests that it may not have been always so but that the cut between women and men in Inner Mani, already twice-deepened by Mediterranean codes of honor and by the relatively recent introduction of church culture, has been deepened again by the incursion of capitalist culture into the area. Where all production is quantified, women's labor is thrust into an invisible world.

However, The Last Word clearly does not just present another instantiation of a general global process, nor is it just a record of rural Greek women's mortuary ceremonies. Rather, it can be read as a fascinating distillation of the great Central Asian struggle between gods of the earth and gods of the sky, which is still going on today. If I were teaching a course on Greek roots to brilliant freshmen, I would have students read Seremetakis between Marija Gimbutas and Julia Kristeva. All three are Eastern European feminists and all three argue that
